NICARAGUA MINISTRIES UPDATE

LANGSTON UNIVERSITY (Tulsa) PRESENTATION

The Nicaragua Store will be at a Social Justice seminar on Friday, October 29th, from 7:30am to 5:00pm. David will be making a presentation at 11:00am about "Nicaragua: Social Justice Through International Partnership".

NICARAGUA VISITORS

We will have two visitors from Chacraseca joining us in worship soon. Elba will be with us on Sunday, October 31st, and Dr. Daysi will be with us on Sunday, November 7th. They will be visiting the United States for the Wine to Water event sponsored by Just-Hope on Thursday, November 4th. Our contribution of support for their visit will be to offer hous-

ing, meals, transportation, and sightseeing. The details of their needs are still being finalized. Keep an eye on the Weekly Call for updated information. If you are able to assist with any of the hosting needs, please contact David.

UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIP ACCOUNT ESTABLISHED

A new account has been established to collect donations for a university scholarship for a student in Chacraseca. The 'seed money' for this account was the 'leftover' funds from the recent mission trip. The team was frugal and budgeted their funds well and had a little over \$300 remaining after the trip. This money was from the personal donations from the team members for their travel expenses. They were given the option of receiving a refund, donating to an existing Nicaragua

account, or establishing a new account for a project. The group unanimously voted to establish a new University Scholarship account since this was one of two needs presented to the team while they were in Chacraseca. While this

account is not a part of our already established Nicaragua commitments for 2010, it is available to anyone who would like to add to it. The current cost for an annual university scholarship is \$600. Please contact David if you have any questions about this.

FAIR TRADE COFFEE PRICE INCREASE

Effective November 13th, the price of Equal Exchange coffee will increase \$1.00 per bag. This reflects the increased price for coffee beans around the world. This is the first price increase in over 6 years. Please know that the farmers are continuing to receive a fair price for their products. Support a just marketing system by purchasing FAIR TRADE goods.

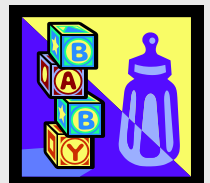

I had the opportunity recently to represent Community of Hope as a delegate to the Kansas/Oklahoma Conference annual meeting. This year it was held in Wichita, Kansas. The Nicaragua Store was represented also as a part of their Fair Trade Market. It

was a great experience meeting folks from throughout the conference and sharing fair trade information with many of them.

Over \$300 in fair trade merchandise was sold! The business side of the meeting included

the passage of three resolutions: how to resolve conference bequests when the donor's wishes are not known, participating in the Equal Exchange UCC Fair Trade Coffee program (we already do this at COH), and supporting our brothers and sisters in Arizona as a result of recent immigration legislation. Next year's meeting will be in Topeka, Kansas. Plan to attend!

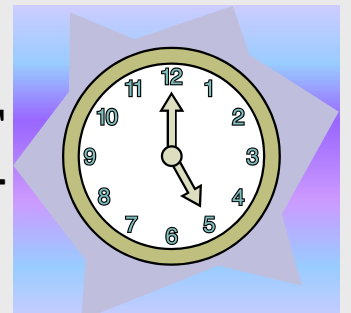

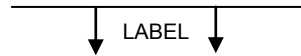
